A new initiative helps our members get into - and stay in - college

he West End House is proud to announce that our services have been expanded to include a focus on college persistence. Many of our high school seniors are the first generation in their family to enroll in college; these young people need specialized support to navigate the complexities surrounding higher education. This fall, a new full-time College Success Coach was added to provide case management. Our College Success Coach, Morgan Bondy, helps students overcome any uncertainties, insecurities or knowledge gaps while also guiding them toward on campus

services. She is their "go-to" person and supports them with non-academic issues such as financial aid, communication with professors and time management skills.

Our persistence program is part of Success Boston, a college completion initiative aimed at dramatically increasing the number of Boston Public School (BPS) students graduating college. The initiative is inspired by a groundbreaking study released by The Boston Foundation revealing that only 35% of BPS students completed a 2- or 4-year college degree within seven years of graduating high school. This number dropped to a sobering 24% when excluding students from Boston's three exam schools, and dropped further still for black and Hispanic males.

> "Sometimes the smallest of roadblocks can throw off our teens," says Mark DaCruz, Director of Teen Services at the West End House. "They might miss the first installment of their payment plan and find all their classes had been dropped. Not knowing their options, they miss

Born in Boston's West End, Mr. Nimoy was a proud member of the Hawks-Brenner Club at the West End House then located on Blossom Street. When Mr. Nimoy first showed an interest in acting, the West End House awarded him a scholarship for \$37.50 to attend an acting class at Boston College.

The man who would impact millions in his role as Mr. Spock hosted our Centennial Celebration in 2006. There, he shared how the West End House was where he and his friends enjoyed new experiences, were challenged by new ideas and became part of something larger than themselves. The impact of the West End House is evident in his own famous words: "The means of many outweigh the means of the few or one."


